

 Refer to the GFWC In-Kind Donation Guide for an estimated value of commonly donated items (available at cfwc.org and gfwc.org).
- Dollars Spent are costs incurred by members, clubs or districts to achieve Advancement Plan goals.
- Dollars Raised reflects the dollars earned from fundraising and development programs and/or projects.

Nonprofit fundraising best practices include developing a compressive plan, identifying and engaging diverse donors, leveraging various fundraising channels and prioritizing donor stewardship. Effective strategies always involve data-driven decision making, ongoing evaluation (what went well last year, what didn't) and adapting to the evolving fundraising landscape such as Raise Right, Ralph's Community Rewards Program or One Cause.

Here is a simple snapshot of suggested annual planning steps:

- Look at your annual calendar: Slot in your events that happen every year and see where you have gaps for new and fresh campaigns.
- Create fundraiser goals: Define how much you want to raise, your target number of attendees for each event and sponsorship goals
- Set a budget: Your budget can help guide your decisions and make sure you maximize revenue for the cause not expenses.
- Develop a sponsor procurement plan: Design a strategy to recruit local and national businesses to sponsor your events throughout the year. Provide them with multiple levels of sponsorship to capture the most sponsorship dollars.
- Secure the right fundraising technology: A powerful fundraising strategy needs powerful fundraising software. Make planning and giving easy with One Cause

Goal setting can help future-proof your club and ensure you are always moving towards your mission. Ask yourself, is your club's mission clear? Once you know where your club currently stands, you can think about where you want to be in 12 months' time. A MESSAGE FROM Corresponding Secretary

Hope everyone had a great summer!

As Corresponding Secretary, one of your major club responsibilities is probably sending out correspondence to club members via E-blasts. If you are newly appointed to this position or if you just need a refresher after summer break, the following rules for email etiquette may be helpful to you.

- 1. All club email requests need to have prior approval by the club president.
- 2. You may want to address your emails to all club members by using the "To:" address line or you can address the recipients by using the "bcc" address line. The latter may be preferred by the club members.
- 3. Use a clear subject line. This will help the recipient prioritize emails. A subject line that is to the point will make it easier to sort through their inbox and decide what communications takes precedence.
- 4. Proofread every email you send. Make sure there are no spelling and grammatical errors. Are you using simple sentence structures and correct capitalization and punctuation?
- 5. Compose your email before entering the recipients' email addresses. It is always best practice to write the contents of your email first in case you accidentally send the message too early.
- 6. Double check your recipient addresses. Are there new members to be added to your list? Has anyone passed away since your last email message? Has anyone sent you a separate message asking you to change their email address?
- 7. You don't always have to "reply all". If someone has a question about an email you sent, you can forward the question to the member who originally requested the e-blast or you can just reply to the sender who is asking the question.
- 8. Send out requested emails and reply to your emails in a very timely manner. This is good etiquette and shows that you take responsibly for your position as corresponding secretary.
- 9. Use the appropriate level of formality. For instance, "Dear Members". Use "please" and "thank you" as necessary. Be sure to add rsvp contact information as needed.
- 10. Your emails should include the "who, what, when, where, and why" details to keep questions and confusion at a minimum.
- 11. Font size matters. When composing your messages, use normal size font and clear font styles. Using bold, ALL CAPS, and large font size indicate YELLING! These styles should only be used in rare cases.
- 12. Repeating email messages and sending reminders should be used at a minimum. Flooding members' inboxes with repeated messages and constant reminders is not recommended.

Set to Record your Club History

It's that time again where clubs are coming back from a summer hiatus and getting back to monthly meetings, upcoming fundraisers, and district events. New boards are taking over, and new members are being recruited, so it's the perfect time to get organized and practice documenting EVERYTHING.

Remember, keeping a record of all the activities and meetings is not only important for tax and finance purposes, but it's also a record of the history of your club and all that you accomplish. Ensuring you have a secretary, or recording secretary, on your board is crucial to maintaining minutes of your meetings and a proof of the philanthropy your club participates in.

Here are some suggestions to help your club recruit the best secretary to record all your meetings and events:

- Be sure to have clear communication on the time commitment and expectations for the person taking on the role. This requires having a detailed description in your bylaws of the duties and realistic skills you want the person to have, including being organized and punctual.
- 2. Be creative in using outreach to find the right person including, but not limited to, social media and community networking. Do not limit yourself to looking only at your current members, this is a chance to recruit a new member who may have the right skill set you're looking for.
- 3. Cultivate a positive environment that will encourage people to take interest in the role. "Taking notes" sounds boring and tedious, it's important to make sure they see the value in the position. Provide a warm and welcoming atmosphere and establish comradery among the board members so everyone feels equally important.

The secretary is not just someone to take a few notes during a meeting, they keep track of member attendance, motions made, upcoming events, promoting the club to the community, membership and so much more. This summer I read a book called "The President's Daughter" by Barbara Chase-Riboud. It told the story of Harriet Hemings. Now some of you might know about her, but for those of you who do not I would like to tell you about this famous woman.

Harriet Hemings was born into slavery at Monticello, the home of Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States, in the first year of his presidency. Most historians believe her father was Jefferson, who is now believed to have fathered, with his slave Sally Hemings, four children who survived to adulthood.

Harriet is believed to be the daughter of Sally Hemings and the widower Thomas Jefferson. Jefferson and his wife Martha Wayles Skelton Jefferson inherited Sally Hemings, her mother Betty Hemings and ten siblings from the estate of her father John Wayles, along with more than 100 other slaves. It is widely believed that Jefferson and Hemings had a 38-year secret relationship beginning in Paris several years after the early death of his wife. We know from the historical and the DNA data that Thomas Jefferson can neither be definitely excluded nor solely implicated in the paternity of illegitimate children with his slave Sally Hemings.

While the question of how to approach the man who wrote the Declaration of Independence and never freed the mother of his children is one that will undoubtedly continue to spark fierce debate for years to come. Harriet Hemings was the daughter of the most powerful man in the country and an enslaved woman thirty years his junior. She grew up in a world where she was both a Jefferson and a slave and lived as both a Black woman and a white woman over the course of her life. Over the course of the last few decades, the unequal relationship between Thomas Jefferson and his slave, Sally Hemings, has come to dominate discussions of Jefferson's legacy as a politician and as a man.

In 1822, at the age of 21, Harriet left Monticello. Jefferson instructed his overseer Edmund Bacon to give her \$50 (equivalent to \$1,180 in 2024) to help on her journey. Although legally she had escaped and was a "fugitive", Jefferson never tried to persuade her to return or posted notice of escape. Harriet Hemings was the only female slave he "freed" in his lifetime. Her brother Madison Hemings later said she had gone to Washington, DC, to join their older brother Beverly Hemings, who had similarly left Monticello earlier that year. Both entered into white society and married white partners of good circumstances. All the Hemings children were legally slaves under Virginia law at the time, in accordance of which they inherited the status of their enslaved mother, who was three-quarters European in ancestry (making them seveneighths European in ancestry). Jefferson freed the two youngest brothers in his will of 1826, so they were legally free.

The story that is told in this book is very interesting when you look at the way the Black slaves were treated and the way that the people of color and from different countries are being treated in our society today. Harriet passed as a white lady and was involved in helping her family, who remained slaves in many ways. If you would like to read more about Thomas Jefferson and his 'mixed' family you would find it very informative on how women have shaped our country for so many years.


