

Project Title: PENNY PINES REFORESTATION PROGRAM Hours 20 Donated \$408 In Kind \$0

California's national forests, sprawling over a vast 20 million acres, equivalent to the size of South Carolina, beckon with natural wonders. Extending from the Mexican border to Oregon, these majestic landscapes face myriad challenges, necessitating the heroic efforts of thousands of firefighters and specialized equipment to combat fires, pests, and diseases. In 1941, the pioneering spirit of conservation took root with California's inaugural Penny Pines plantation, championed by the San Francisco Sportswomen's Association. Over the years, this noble cause has witnessed a surge in participation, with Garden and Women's Clubs, Boys and Girls Scouts of America, and various civic and social groups joining the ranks. The inception of Penny Pines saw the production of seedlings for a mere penny each, with approximately 680 seedlings cultivating an acre of hope. Today, the USDA Forest Service continues the tradition, urging donations in increments of \$68.00. Donors, such as the Woman's Club of Cypress, have the privilege to designate their funds to a specific National Forest, exemplifying the enduring commitment to preserving these natural treasures. In a proud moment of conservation, the Woman's Club of Cypress directed their \$680.00 donation to the Angeles National Forest, contributing to the continued vitality of California's breathtaking wilderness.
