Reporting season is almost upon us! It's time to start gathering the details and tallying the hours. OC clubs do sooo much and help sooo many in our Orange County communities. I hope every club will submit reports this year to share what we did, collectively, to Get-The-Job-Done (while having fun)!

### **2025 reporting period is Jan 1 – Dec 31, 2025**

**Confirm your club's reporting size** (based on membership as of July 31, 2025). Use # and club size shown on page 23 of Orange District 2025-26 yearbook, regardless of whether you've gained new members since July 31.

## A MESSAGE FROM 1ST VP DFAN

Linda Queen, lindaqueen@roadrunner.com 714-501-5725 **CFWC's 2025 report forms** will be provided to Orange District club deans when they become available from the state (usually early November).

**IMPORTANT!** The 2025 report-writing workshop is **NOVEMBER 10** – club deans (or club pres) @ 10am; OC reporting chairmen @ 11am (on Zoom). An email reminder and Zoom link will go out the week before.

**HEY!!** Are you a project chairman? Did you plan a club project this year? Will you be asked to write about that project so it can be included in your club report? Are you responsible for, or assist in, writing your club's reports? If you answered "YES" to any of these, here are some **REPORT-WRITING TIPS...** 

- It is NOT necessary to include every project in the narrative report.
- Highlight projects that were: unique; successful; had good participation; made an impact and/or increased club awareness in the community.
- Write in an active, upbeat manner; use engaging and descriptive adjectives.
- A "narrative report" means sentences and paragraphs; NOT a list of bullet points.
- Use language that conveys pride -- in your club, in the work you did, and in your members.
- Do NOT include photos or use individual names.
- Identify acronyms before using them. For example, write out "California Federation of Women's Clubs" or "General Federation of Women's Clubs" the first time they are mentioned, followed by the acronym in parentheses: (CFWC)/(GFWC). You can now use CFWC or GFWC in the rest of the report.
- Include the hours members spent planning a project; setting up for the project; 3) working the activity;
   and 4) traveling to/from project planning meetings. \*Do not include time from outside volunteers\*
- Always use the full and correct name of any organization, company, school, etc. that is mentioned.
- Font can be **no smaller than 11 pt** (Calibri or Ariel fonts are good options)
- Review sample reports at www.cfwcorangedistrict.com



# Orange District Member Spotlight Myrt Perisho, Rossmoor Woman's Club

This year Myrt Perisho was recognized for her over 50 years of membership in the Rossmoor Woman's Club (RWC). She joined in 1971 when her third and last child started first grade.

Myrt has an entertaining personality and loves sharing tales about the club's "old days." RWC had fewer sections back then and the meetings were more formal. For instance, at the Pot Pourri section meetings home-cooked specialties were presented on fancy dishes.

Something from Costco would have been frowned upon. When it was Myrt's turn to host, she asked a new restaurant in town if they would come and do a food demonstration for their section meeting.

The restaurant took this opportunity to market themselves in the Rossmoor community. They set up their barbeque equipment in Myrt's backyard, cooked fish and shrimp, and provided everything free of cost. That restaurant is very popular today. It is the famous Fish Company!

Another section Myrt likes to talk about was a section she and a fellow member, Jackie, started called "Road Runners." Once a month they rented a 49-passenger bus and took members on road trips to places like Tijuana, the Garment District, Riverside Victorian Homes, and Solvang (over-nighter). Sometimes they had so many people who wanted to go that they had to get two buses. They would serve coffee and pastries on the way over and wine with appetizers on the way back while they played BINGO for silly prizes. One tale Myrt likes to tell is about the skinned, bloody goat head from a butcher shop at the LA Century Market downtown. It was gift-wrapped and when the winning member opened it, she threw it up in the air and it landed in the lap of the lady behind her. It was quite hilarious! When they were done with their joke the bus driver asked if he could take the goat head home as it was considered a delicacy in his household.

Myrt was on the RWC Board for many years and has seen many changes. She is proud of what the club has accomplished and what it has done for her. "I don't think people outside our club realize how much charity work we do. It's been such a big part of my life. Most of my friends in life I met in the club. When my husband and daughter died of cancer, they supported my family with food and friendship." Today Myrt does the same for fellow members and often organizes a food train.



# Ways to handle the Gift Card dilemma with the Holidays almost here

What happens when you purchase a gift card to send as a gift only to find out from the recipient it has a ZERO balance. Embarrassing right? — It happens more than we realize.

Scammers discreetly break into gift card packaging while the cards are still on the store rack, stealing the card number, and any pin instructions. Once a card is purchased and activated, the scammer knows the card is activated, they then can use it at their leisure but more than likely right away before someone else can do so.

Unfortunately, there is little to no recourse once the funds have been removed from the gift card however it's best to save your purchase receipt and take a photo of it for proof of purchase.

If you find yourself needing a gift card last minute and you do purchase from a retailer here are a few before you buy tips:

**Inspect the packaging;** Look for any signs of tampering, like peeled stickers or scratched-off barcodes as more than likely the PIN has been stolen.

**Choose secure locations:** opt for gift cards that are locked in a secure display or kept behind the register, as these are harder for criminals to access and tamper with.

**Avoid large kiosk displays:** These are common targets for fraudsters, its best and safer to buy card that are more secure.

**Consider digital cards:** Sending an electronic gift card directly to the recipient's email is a safer alternative to physical cards.

How about skipping the retail gift card dilemma all together. A great way to avoid all this and raise money for your Club at the same time is Raise Right. A fundraising platform that lets your club raise money through everyday purchases like shopping, dining and travel. Enrolled participants buy gift cards or shop online though the Raise Right shopping portal and earn money for their club.

### THE CALL

I know we have shared this several times before, but I still hear from members it's too hard or its inconvenient. It's really not. It just takes a few steps to enroll. I have used it many times with my own club. Here is an example:

My local club signed up our organization; we notified our members at our monthly meeting and helped them to enroll. I downloaded the Raise Right App and linked my credit card and/or debit card into the secure app. Raise Right will send alerts when they have specials on Gift Cards or shopping.

We were taking our daughter and son in law to a restaurant for dinner. About a week or two before the dinner I received an alert that Raise Right was giving 14% back on very restaurant we were going to for dinner. I purchased \$200 to the restaurant as e-gift cards. I placed them directly in my Apple iPhone Wallet. Nothing to print out. Once I paid for the gift cards (not used them) my club received \$28 dollars deposited in our club's account. It's a Win-Win for you & your club.

Another opportunity is to use the online shopping portal. We all shop online at stores such as Macy's, Old Navy, Nike, Sephora, Kohl's, Best Buy, eBay or Michael's just to name a few. There are hundreds of stores in the online portal. You log into the Raise Right app and review their offers, or you can set up alerts to know when they appear. Select a store and the portal takes you directly to the store's website. Shop and Raise Right will send funds directly to your club's account.

If this is still too much, a Club can prepurchase gift cards in bulk and provide them to members for the face value. No individual account necessary. The Holidays are almost upon us, and many stores will be promoting their gift card and online shopping so now the time to get started.

### A message from Marsha LaRusso - The Finance Team

I am confident that everyone has filed all necessary paperwork for the federal and state taxing agencies as I outlined in the previous publication. Now we are going to renew our raffle permits for the following calendar year, 2025. I know it is only October, but the process takes time, and you want to be fully prepared for all the fundraisers that include raffles.

You will go to the Office of the Attorney General website: oag.ca.gov/charities and look for form CT NRP-1.

Fill out the form and include the \$30 fee. You must wait to receive a registration confirmation letter before conducting the raffle or selling raffle tickets. The raffle form to report the previous year, 2024, will be due February 1st, 2025. You go to the same website and find the form CT-NRP-2. Only raffle proceeds/expenses are included in the report.

Always remember to keep a copy for the club or District records.

### **LEAD BY EXAMPLE**

The courage it takes to step up and be a part of the board for your club isn't easy, but it is rewarding knowing you are an integral part of the organization. Each member plays a part in helping the club grow and thrive, and the role of recording secretary is no different. You become the gatekeeper to the knowledge and history of the club, logging reports and minutes and photos and events. Here are some keyways in which a recording secretary is so important:

- 1. Write articles for your club newsletter encouraging members to participate in activities, take photos at events and submit them, and write feedback for the board.
- 2. Become a mentor and allow members to shadow you and what you do by attending board meetings, help take notes during member meetings and collect information on events. This will allow those interested in stepping up as secretary to have a better understanding of what you do.
- 3. Help plan and implement bi-annual historical events with the club to introduce new members to the history of your organization and remind current members how and where the club got its start.
- 4. Plan and document an annual event by inviting community members to see what your club is all about and encourage participation. This you can coordinate with your membership chair to help inspire future leaders.

These ideas and more are a great way to branch out as a recording secretary and become more than just the one who takes minutes of meetings. Remember to include photos from your events and activities, they say a picture can be worth 1,000 words.


### Happy Autumn

### National First Responders Day – October 28

In 2019 a six-year push, inspired by heroism and tragedy, culminated when a bipartisan group of senators successfully passed legislation to annually observe October 28 as National First Responders Day, a day to honor the service and sacrifice of those answering the call in their communities. While there are several days to exclusively show appreciation of EMS providers and law enforcement, National First Responders Day honors the collective work of all public safety professionals.

Though there have been sporadic efforts throughout the years for a specific day honoring first responders, it took a tragedy and the efforts of a grieving community to put the resolution in successful motion.

Pamela Tice, pamela\_tice@yahoo.com 714-686-6492 The unofficial origin of National First Responders Day can be traced to the death of 26-year-old police officer Sean Collier, who was shot and killed by two men responsible for the 2013 Boston Marathon Bombing. In the wake of Collier's death, his brother, Andrew, began advocating for the creation of a national day to honor all first responders. "This is the next step," Andrew told the Boston Herald in 2016. "On Memorial Day after Sean died, I noted how we, rightfully, honor our veterans. Our first responders are our front line here at home. We deal with them every day. They save lives and take care of us. It's a huge safety net. It makes the most sense to honor and show them the support they really deserve."

Andrew continued to advocate for the day of appreciation, garnering media attention and the support of national organizations and spurring hundreds of thousands to sign petitions for the proposal. Ultimately, Andrew's goal was to honor his brother's sacrifice and the service of first responders across the country succeeded.

Think about what they do in your own community, where they may have done heroic acts of bravery on a daily basis, and



gone unrecognized. Take this time to think about honoring your local EMT's, the Police and Fire Station personnel at this time. They are always on call for our emergencies, both large and small.



### **Emma Lazarus**

July 22, 1849 - November 19, 1897



She was an American author of poetry, prose, and translations, as well as an activist for Jewish and Georgist causes. She is remembered for writing the sonnet "The New Colossus", which was inspired by the Statue of Liberty, in 1883.[1] Its lines appear inscribed on a bronze plaque, installed in 1903,[2] on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty.[3]

Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!

Judy Wagner tweetywag@aol.com 714-308-7502 Lazarus was involved in aiding refugees to New York who had fled antisemitic pogroms in eastern Europe, and she saw a way to express her empathy for these refugees in terms of the statue.[4] The last lines of the sonnet were set to music by Irving Berlin as the song "Give Me Your Tired, Your Poor" for the 1949 musical Miss Liberty, which was based on the sculpting of the Statue of Liberty (Liberty Enlightening the World). The latter part of the sonnet was also set by Lee Hoiby in his song "The Lady of the Harbor" written in 1985 as part of his song cycle "Three Women".

Lazarus was also the author of Poems and Translations (New York, 1867); Admetus, and other Poems (1871); Alide: An Episode of Goethe's Life (Philadelphia, 1874); Poems and Ballads of Heine (New York, 1881); Poems, 2 Vols.; Narrative, Lyric and Dramatic; as well as Jewish Poems and Translations.[5]

Emma Lazarus was born in New York City, July 22, 1849,[6] into a large Jewish family. She was the fourth of seven children of Moses Lazarus, a wealthy merchant[7] and sugar refiner,[8] and Esther Nathan (of a long-established German-Jewish New York family).[9] One of her great-grandfathers on the Lazarus side was from Germany;[10] the rest of her Lazarus ancestors were originally from Portugal and they were among the original twenty-three Portuguese Jews who arrived in New Amsterdam after they

fled Recife, Brazil, in an attempt to flee from the Inquisition.[11][8] Lazarus's great-great-grandmother on her mother's side, Grace Seixas Nathan (born in Stratford, Connecticut, in 1752) was also a poet.[12] Lazarus was related through her mother to Benjamin N. Cardozo, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. Her siblings included sisters Josephine, Sarah, Mary, Agnes and Annie, and a brother, Frank.[13][14][15] Privately educated by tutors from an early age, she studied American and British literature as well as several languages, including German, French, and Italian.[16] She was attracted in youth to poetry, writing her first lyrics when she was eleven years old.[17]


