Annual Registration Renewal Fee Report to Attorney General of California

Due 15th day of the 5th month after the close of the club's fiscal year (every year)

If your gross revenues or assets are over \$25,000 you must attach a copy of your from 990EZ or 990.

The filing fee varies depending on the club's gross revenue.

If the revenue is less than \$50,000 fee is \$25, if between \$50,000 and \$100,000 it is \$50.00.

Form CT-TR-1 Annual Treasurer's Report to Attorney General of California

If gross receipts are below \$50,000 and did not file form 990 or 990EZ then you are required to file this form Go to www.sos.ca.gov; select business; Under business Programs select #2. Corporation Statement of Information File Online; enter corporation number or name.

Filing Fee is \$20.00



Gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less.

There is a \$10 filing fee

Form 990 — Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax

Due 15th day of the 5th month after the close of the organization's tax year

Gross receipts of \$200,000 or more per year or total assets are \$500,000.

Form 990EZ — Short Form Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax

Due 15th day of the 5th month after the close of the organization's tax year

Gross receipts are less than \$200,000 per year and assets less than \$500.000.

Form 990-N (e-Postcard) Organizations Annual Gross Receipts \$50,000 or less You must register with a username and password before you begin

Due 15th day of the 5th month after the close of the organization's tax year

Eight items of Basic Information:

- 1. Taxpayer Identification Number
- 2. Tax Year
- 3. Legal Name & Mailing Address
- 4. Any other name the organization uses
- 5. Name and address of Principal Officer
- 6. Web site address if the organization has one
- 7. Confirmation that the organization annual gross receipts are \$50,000 or less
- 8. If applicable a statement that the organization has terminated

Remember to print or make extra copies of all forms and confirmations for your club records, and to include when sending in the RRF-1 Form.



REGISTERING & REPORTING RAFFLES Raffle Registration Update:

As of April 1, 2023, the new Raffle Registration year will be the calendar year (January 1-December 31).

The Raffle report (CT-NRP-2) form is due by 2/1/2024. New forms CT-NRP-1 and CT-NRP-2 became available April 1, 2023. Your 2024 applications will be accepted starting on October 1, 2023.

The "raffles" subpage contains detailed information, forms and an informative video explaining legalities and requirements concerning holding raffles, opportunity drawings, giveaways, etc.

Although raffles are generally considered gambling by the State of California, there is a narrow exception for tax-exempt organizations which allow them to conduct properly registered raffles to raise funds for beneficial or charitable purposes. At least 90% of the gross raffle receipts must be used for charitable or beneficial purposes of the organization conducting the raffle or for the benefit of another eligible organization.

The annual raffle registration/reporting period is January 1 through December 31. Raffles can be registered at any time during the registration period; however, the registered raffle(s) must occur on or before December 31.

What you need to know:

Holding legitimate raffles is a two-step process. Step one takes place before the year in which you plan to have raffles: and step two takes place after the end of the year in which all your raffles take place.

Step One – BEFORE - Register raffle(s) with Calif Atty General's Registry of Charitable Trusts.

Submit Registration Form CT-NRP-I* (+ \$30.00 fee). Whether your organization plans to hold one raffle or several between Jan 1-Dec 31. You must file a Nonprofit Raffle Registration at least 60 days BEFORE the first raffle of the year occurs. I recommend having the Registration form filled out and in the mail by October 1 of each year. If desired, dates of all raffles planned during the active registration period can be included on the registration form. Note: you must wait to receive a registration confirmation letter before conducting the raffle or selling raffle tickets.

Step Two – AFTER – Report on all raffles held during the year.

Submit Form CT-NRP-2* After all the raffles have occurred. You must submit a Nonprofit Raffle Report that includes all raffles held during the prior Jan-Dec reporting period. This report is due February 1. If a raffle is part of a larger fundraising event, be sure to maintain a separate record of raffle proceeds and expenses. Only raffle proceeds/expenses are included in the report.

Women's Leadership Then and Now *

In the early 20th century, women in most countries lacked voting rights and were excluded from political and corporate leadership. Leadership roles were informal - expressed through activism, philanthropy, education, community organizing. A major milestone came in 1920 with the ratification of the 19th Amendment, granting the first American women the right to vote.

Following World War II, women entered the workforce in greater numbers, yet leadership remained largely male-dominated. The 1960's and 70's brought the women's liberation movement, challenging societal norms and demanding equal opportunities-remember the symbolic "bra burning" protests?

The late 20th century saw progress with women in politics and executive offices, and with gender equality becoming a recognized global goal. Today, in the 21st century, women lead some of the world's largest companies. Social media and global movements like #MeToo and Time's Up, have amplified conversations about gender bias and equality. Women's leadership has evolved from grassroots activism to holding the highest offices in politics, business, and global organizations. Women leaders are often celebrated for collaborative, empathetic and inclusive approaches

The General Federation of Women's Clubs offers a unique opportunity to develop leadership skills through its LEADS program, held on the Friday before the GFWC Annual convention. Each state selects one candidate to attend, but all members can access LEADS resources through the GFWC Member Portal. The Leadership Committee encourages every state to host a LEADS Program. Leadership grows when we share it. As you prepare for this next club year, be sure to offer opportunities for leadership growth.

To that point, the CFWC LEADS Meeting is scheduled for February 26-28, 2026, in Santa Clara, CA. The Orange District winner must be available to attend the CFWC LEADS meeting on those dates.

Ada Lovelace (1815-1852)

Ada Lovelace (born December 10, 1815, Piccadilly Terrace, Middlesex [George now in London], England—died November 27, 1852, Marylebone, London). The daughter Lord Byron (a famous poet) and Lady Anne Byron. Lord Byron left the family soon after Ada was born, and Ada never met him. He never returned to England.

Ada Lovelace Day is an annual event held on the second Tuesday of October to celebrate and raise awareness of the contributions of women to STEM fields. This year it is on October 15, 2025. It is named after mathematician and computer science pioneer Ada Lovelace. It started in 2009 as a "day of blogging"; and has since become a multi-national event with conferences. It aims to increase the profile of women in STEM and, in doing so, create new role models who will encourage more girls into STEM careers and support women.

Ada is often regarded as the world's first software engineer, but did you know she came up with her ideas way before computers were even invented? Since she was born in 1815! Her mother hired the

most knowledgeable experts and tutors to teach Ada about logic, science and mathematics. When she was a young girl, before they were invented, she wanted to invent a flying machine.






At seventeen she attended a party and met a famous inventor and Mathematician, Charles Babbage. He had designed the Difference Engine, which was basically an early version of the calculator.

In 1843 Ada made notes on Babbage's newest design, an updated version of the Difference Engine that was called the Analytical Engine. In her notes, Ada predicted the engine could follow codes to calculate numbers and form letters. This was an early model of what would become known as a computer. Cin, a book on digital computing in 1953, more than 100 years after she had made them. The book explained how computers follow patterns in order to work just as Ada had predicted.

She married William King at nineteen. She was called countess Lovelace after William became an earl. They had three children together and Ada continued to be involved in the fields of inventions, Mathletics and science throughout her life.



I hope that you enjoy reading about the Women in History that have made an impact in our lives today. In the early 1800's and 1900's many women shaped the History and continue to shape our history today in many fields. GFWC 2025 Federal Legislative Priorities (119th Congress, 2025 - 2026) February 2025

Signature Program: Domestic and Sexual Violence Awareness and Prevention

VAWA Appropriations: GFWC urges Congress to provide increased federal funding for FY 2025 and FY 2026 to provide safety, access to services, and justice for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Survivors rely on federally funded direct services such as shelter, rape crisis response, legal assistance, and counseling. Communities rely on prevention programs, available 24-hour hotlines, and trauma-informed training for law enforcement.

Anti-trafficking: GFWC urges Congress to pass anti-trafficking and anti-exploitation bills reauthorizing essential programs to support survivors and combat human trafficking in all forms, both domestically and internationally. Proposed legislation, the Trafficking Survivors Relief Act, would provide federal criminal relief to survivors of human trafficking who committed a nonviolent offense as a direct result of having been a victim of trafficking. GFWC supports efforts to strengthen collaboration between federal, state, and local law enforcement, and improve resources available to survivors.

Victims of Crime Act: GFWC supports robust funding for the Crime Victims Fund authorized by the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA). The Fund is financed by criminal fines and penalties from convictions in federal court, not taxpayer dollars. The Office of Victims of Crime disburses money from this fund to states and other entities to support victim compensation and assistance programs, including domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, child advocacy centers, and other child sexual abuse treatment programs. Proposed bipartisan legislation, the Crime Victims Fund Stabilization Act, would redirect unobligated resources collected through the False Claim Act to the Crime Victims Fund for five years, while maintaining critical protection and compensation for whistleblowers.

Advocates for Children

Online Safety: GFWC supports efforts to prevent online sexual exploitation of children. Proposed legislation includes the TAKE IT DOWN Act which will criminalize the publication of nonconsensual intimate imagery, including AI-generated deepfakes, require social media and other websites to remove such images within 48 hours of receiving notice from the victim, and ensure that perpetrators are held accountable. The SHIELD Act would provide federal law enforcement with the tools they need to crack down on privacy violations, provide victims with legal protections, and hold exploiters accountable. Additional bills are expected.

Arts and Culture

GFWC supports increased funding for the National Endowment for the Arts to enhance state and local programs that help transform communities into beautiful and resilient places through strategies that incorporate arts and culture.

Civic Engagement and Outreach

GFWC urges Congress to reauthorize the Older Americans Act and the Farm Bill, protecting funding and strengthening programs addressing hunger and food insecurity.

Education and Libraries

GFWC supports federal funding for STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) programs; strong educational programs with challenging academic curricula for all students including those with learning, social, mental, and physical disabilities; and increased funding for the Institute of Museum and Library Services to strengthen local community resources.

Environment

GFWC encourages balance between the interests of proper management of resources, adequate water supplies, protection of wildlife, and the interests of energy production, including more fuel-efficient and renewable energy sources.

Health and Wellness

Global Vaccinations: GFWC supports funding the CDC's polio eradication and measles elimination programs through the Health and Human Services appropriations bill, and funding through the State Department/Foreign Operations appropriations bill for immunizations and improving global disease detection systems that enable other nations to effectively detect and efficiently respond to a range of other diseases. Preventing diseases at their source is the most cost-effective approach, saves the most lives, and makes the world more resilient to new viruses that could cause the next pandemic. Without coordination and rapid analysis of national and international public health data, private sector pharmaceutical manufacturers would not have the lead time required to roll out updated vaccines at scale and prevent deaths. The United States must remain the global leader in medical research and innovation.

Breast Cancer Screenings: GFWC urges Congress to require all health insurance plans to cover screenings, supplemental screenings, and diagnostic examinations at no cost to patients who are at greater risk for breast cancer. Beginning September 2024, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) requires radiology services to inform patients whether they have dense breasts.
