Project Title: Woman's Transitional Living Center Hours: 50 Donated \$ 1,000 In-Kind \$50

In honor of Domestic Violence Month, in October, the WCOF invited a representative from the Women's Transitional Living Center, which is an organization that has a shelter for clients with substance abuse problems, mental illnesses and human trafficking victims, so we could present them with a wide array of items for their Safety Net Welcome Kits. These kits included bath towels, hand towels, laundry baskets, twin sheets sets, pillows, bags filled with kids & adults coloring books, and crayons, toiletries including shampoo, conditioner, shavers, shaving gel, bar soap, shower gel and much more. We also purchased gift cards from Marshalls and Home goods. These are used for when the clients need to set up their own apartments for the first time. Gift cards from local food restaurants like Jack in the Box, Taco Bell and Burger King were also given. We are always so happy to support this great organization.

Project Title: Human Trafficking Event Hours: 100 Donated \$ 200 In-Kind \$ 0

Four members along with an outside organization are preparing and setting up a free screening of the movie "Trafficked" starring Ashley Judd and Patrick Duffy. "Trafficked" revolves around 3 young women who were forced into slavery in the international sex trade, entering the trade from various socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds. Duffy plays the corrupt Congressman Christian Conrad, his first "bad guy", a character which he describes as a wolf in sheep's clothing. Sex trafficking is a \$150 billion industry. Youth in Orange County are being groomed for sex trafficking and AWARENESS is the best way to fight it. We as a club are about empowering women and we want to spread the word and raise much needed awareness.

Project Title: WTLC Clothing Drive Hours: 40 Donated \$ 0 In-Kind \$ 450

The Woman's Club of Fullerton collected 41 large bags of gently used women's clothing, shoes, baby clothes and young children's apparel to donate to the Women's Transitional Center's Thrift Store this year. This is where WTLC clients can go to choose much needed clothing and shoes and household items to make a fresh start in life after they have left their homes without these items. The staff was so glad to receive such an abundance of clothing and shoes to provide to the various families they serve. WCOF feels it is so rewarding to be able to help victims of Domestic Violence.

Project Title: Toiletries for WTLC Hours: 20 Donated \$ 0 In-Kind \$ 200

On the 21st of October, members of The Woman's Club of Fullerton gathered together to bag toiletries for the Women's Traditional Living Center. We collect sample size bottles of shampoo, conditioner, and body lotion and soaps for the Center throughout the year. The Domestic Violence Chair welcomed us to her office conference room where 10 members bagged the items into large Ziploc bags. The Women's Transitional Living Center members came by later that afternoon to pick up the bags. The toiletries were very much appreciated.
